

The Power of Parents

How parents shape **employment retention** for individuals with disabilities



40%

Adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) who had **active parental involvement in their employment** journey were 40% more likely to retain their jobs for more than one year compared to those without such involvement.

Consistent family support, including help with accessing vocational services, significantly **increases job retention** for individuals with disabilities, helping them stay employed longer.

Long-term career success is significantly higher for individuals with disabilities whose **parents were actively involved** in career planning and employment advocacy.

Individuals with disabilities whose parents had high expectations for their employment were nearly twice as likely to **maintain stable employment over a two-year period.**

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El Poder de los Padres

Cómo los padres influyen en la retención laboral de las personas con discapacidad

Los adultos con discapacidades intelectuales y del desarrollo (IDD) que contaron con **una participación activa de sus padres en su trayectoria laboral** tuvieron un 40% más de probabilidades de conservar sus empleos durante más de un año, en comparación con aquellos sin dicha participación.

El apoyo familiar constante, incluida la ayuda para acceder a servicios vocacionales, **aumenta significativamente la retención laboral** de las personas con discapacidad, ayudándolas a permanecer empleadas por más tiempo.

El éxito profesional a largo plazo es significativamente mayor para las personas con discapacidad cuyos **padres participaron activamente** en la planificación de su carrera y en la defensa del empleo.
